Flooding LLFA follow up visit

During a recent follow up meeting, the LLFA (Local Lead Flood Agency) have requested for residents to call in any flooding issues to NLC, be internal or external – no matter how small; for example, flood water present in a garage or flood waters accumulating on the highway. By telephoning NLC, flood statistics are generated and passed to the LLFA. The LLFA team stated that West Halton is (for some reason!!) low down on NLC's floor priorities so we need to bombard them with calls concerning flooding issues.

West Halton Hill Refuse operation

FCC, the company who run this site, invited the PC to look around the site, in view of recent residents' concerns over lorry traffic and current activity. Several soil surface areas of the landfill site have settled and 'pitted' thus allowing water to accumulate on the surface. The lorries have been bringing in clean, uncontaminated soil to reinstate a smooth, solid surface, prior to re-grassing. The current activity has ceased at the time of writing, however it is expected to re-start once drier weather has arrived. If any residents have any more concerns regarding the land fill site, please do contact Council. FCC are willing to discuss any issues that residents are worried about.

March 2025 sees the end of the current PC financial year. Did you know that Parish Council accounts need to be audited twice? Once by a local 'internal' auditor and once by am 'external' Government appointed auditor. Our un-audited year end accounts will be published on our web site shortly, to be replaced by the audited ones later in the year

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Allotment mains water

All the necessary pipework, fixtures and fittings have now been purchased. The contractor will be coming in the next few weeks to dig the trench for the mains water to be connected. There will be some pipework protruding out of the ground for several weeks, just outside the allotment gates. We will ensure the area is barriered off for health and safety reason. The pipework will be there whilst Anglian Water apply for permission to work on the highway. Unfortunately, the road will have to be closed for a day whilst the connection takes place.

Litter bin

NLC have installed a new large litter bin outside the Alkborough Lane exit to the village field and it will be emptied during their weekly rounds.

The small bin which was installed on the wall has now been removed

Chestnut Mowing

Chestnut Mowing has made the first village field and cemetery cuts and they will be back fortnightly to keep our community looking tidy. The verges have also received their first cut of the season.

Police speed check

We have been pushing the Police to bring speed cameras to our villages in an attempt to deter this anti-social activity. A recent visit took place, and more visits will take place in the not too distant future. Our SID statistics are being forwarded onto the local constabulary so they can continue to understand the issues our communities are facing.

Car Park Re-vamp

We are still working on this project. Now that we are into the next financial year, we can apply for grant funding. It is proposed to put a low fence around the area to prevent cars driving onto the field. A removable portion of fence will be required to allow approved vehicular access.

We have noticed several young people come regularly to use the football pitch for training. We are proposing to install a removable height barrier. By doing this it will hopefully allow us to leave the barrier open more often to allow people to park on the car park. Not the village verges.

The PC are also considering installing a gate to the left of the barrier to allow pedestrian access to the play area, so that people do not have to squeeze through the small gap or duck below the barrier.

ST ETHELDREDAS CHURCH

Once again our year of services began in early February with our Candlemas service held in the evening by candlelight. Although it's our first service of the year, it also brings to an end the church's Christmas season, and following this, the Christmas wreath decorations and the Christmas tree are packed away for another year. Both this and the March service were well attended and we are very grateful to have our services led by Rev. David Beverley, who was at one time Chaplain to the Scunthorpe Steel works.

March has been a busy time in the churchyard and the first Saturday saw a visit from the Community Payback team — actually, it was two teams of 6 with two supervisors that arrived as one team had had their placement cancelled at short notice. Their loss was our gain, and the team of 14 started to clear the overgrown vegetation, brambles and ivy from the east and south perimeter walls. It was soon clear that more visits would be needed to complete the clearance of the entire churchyard and so the team visited on each of the following three Saturdays.

The team worked hard and with good humour and we were impressed at how much was cleared on each visit. Not only are the walls clear of ivy, but the large Sycamore trees have been 'ringed' of ivy growth, some having the branches stripped of it completely. This has not only transformed the churchyard, but also the approach to the village from the south, as the churchyard wall is now completely visible from the road. The snowdrops that were such a beautiful sight in February have now been replaced with a carpet of lemon and pink primroses and the lush leaf growth of the bluebells has appeared on the south side of the chancel wall. It's worth a walk through in the gorgeous sunshine we've been having to be delighted by the sight of them all!

ST ETHELDREDAS CHURCH

The wreath making workshops that are held each December have always been held to raise funds for the restoration and repair of the church building. In April the stonemason will visit church to begin to remove loose and inappropriate mortar from the south elevation of the chancel wall, re-pointing it as necessary to prevent water ingress into the building, particularly around the window tracery. The guttering will also be removed and re-levelled......lets hope the good weather continues for this work. Thank-you to all who attend these workshops. Not only do you produce the most fabulous wreath creations, but you help to keep our beautiful church watertight and windproof.

Our next services are planned as follows;

Sunday 27th April 2025 11:15am Holy Communion Service. This will be a United Service with the congregations from Alkborough, Whitton, Burton and Flixborough joining together at West Halton for a service led by Rev Phillip Brent.

Sunday 25th May 11:15am Holy Communion Service with Rev David Beverley.

Sunday 22nd June 11:15am Holy Communion Service with Rev David Beverley. This will be our patronal festival as St. Etheldreda's day is celebrated annually on June 23rd.

Our village service falls on the fourth Sunday of each month and so as Mother's Day and Easter Day this year do not fall on 'our' service day, we have not been able to host special services for these special days this year.

As always, there is a warm welcome to all our regular parishioners and any new people who wish to come along and worship in our lovely church.

We will be holding an Act of Remembrance in November. More information to follow at a later date
